TWO NEW CITIZENS ON THE SHORE



After studying for many months with tutors Karen Morris and Peggy Keating, ESLC learners Asuman Kahyaoglu and Hung Tang have recently become US citizens.

What is involved in becoming a citizen?

First, there is a \$725.00 fee which includes a background check. Once that has been completed along with the necessary paperwork, an interview date is set. At this interview the applicant will be judged on his/her English speaking and comprehension and will be asked 6-10 questions about US history or government . There is a list of 100 questions that can be asked so the applicant must spend time studying and understanding these questions. The applicant must read a sentence out loud to the satisfaction of the interviewer. If he/she fails part of the interview, they are able to come back for a second attempt.

Asuman is from Turkey and has been living on the Eastern Shore for 6 years and is a learner with the ESLC for 2 years. She received her citizenship in July, 2017. When asked about her goals, she said, "My immediate goal is to attend ESCC where I would study Early Childhood Education. I want to be certified to work with children in the schools. I want to have a job. I worked in my country of Turkey, and I want to work here. I want to help support myself and share the financial responsibilities with my husband. I can

be both American and Turkish-Here is my home!" She has submitted an application to be a volunteer at RSMH. She has sent us the following poem.

FAMILY LITERACY GRANTS RECEIVED

Equipping people with the skills necessary for success in the workplace is critical to creating a healthy community. As long-time supporters of education and workforce development, Tyson Foods Foundation and Perdue have opened up an opportunity for families of ESOL students to gain and/or improve those skills at Pungoteague Elementary School, a Title I school (a high percentage of low income students). Grants of \$12,500 from Tysons and \$10,000 from Perdue will be used to fund two levels of ESOL classes and provide companion childcare and Family Literacy throughout the 2018-2019 school year. The classes will also include activities that will teach parents the skills necessary for their children's academic success and how to be supportive of their child's learning. Once a month parents and children will interact in sessions provided by outside individuals and community organizations. These combined classes and activities together will give families the tools to make sustainable changes to their knowledge and in their future. Plans are under way to begin this project in September. The Eastern Shore Literacy Council and its teachers and volunteer tutors do change lives!

Program Coordinator Raquel Strand has been attending Open Houses at local schools to encourage parents who need help with their English to sign up for our English for Speakers of Other Languages classes beginning soon.

Classes will be held at Metompkin Elementary School starting 9/10 from 6-8 PM and will continue on Mondays and Wednesdays throughout the school year. Our new program at Pungoteague is planned to begin on Tuesday 9/11 from 6-8PM and will continue Tuesdays and Thursdays during the school year. An important aspect of the classes is that child care is provided, leading to better attendance and allowing for Family Literacy presentations.

Family Literacy Programs involving both the parents and children are planned with the Barrier Islands Center, Eastern Shore Public Library, Chesapeake Bay Field Station, and other groups. There is usually a hands-on project during or after each presentation which encourages parents and children working together.
