# Literacy Council Appoints New Executive Director

The Eastern Shore Literacy Council Board of Directors is pleased to announce the appointment of Rose Rulon as Executive Director. Rose comes to the Literacy Council with over 20 years of work experience with local non-profit organiza-

tions, including the Eastern Shore of Virginia Chamber of Commerce and ESVA Tourism Commission, the Foodbank of Southeastern Virginia and the Eastern Shore, and the YMCA of South Hampton Roads. Since retiring as Business Director at the Eastern Shore Family YMCA in 2015, Rose has been working part-time at YMCA Camp Silver Beach.

"This is a time of opportunity and growth for the Eastern Shore Literacy Council. Rose brings with her the talents, enthusiasm and confidence needed to move the organization forward," stated Steve

Doan, Board President.

Rose said, "Literacy is more than just reading. It's about increasing knowledge and it's about succeeding. I'm excited to be working with an energetic board of directors, staff, volunteers, tutors and most of all the learners, as we build on 34 years of service to the community and continue developing programs and partnerships to provide free tutoring opportunities for adults needing to improve literacy skills."

The Eastern Shore Literacy Council provides adults over the age of 18, with the very lowest literacy levels, tutoring through two programs: Adult Basic Education (ABE) and English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL). All instruction is free. After successful completion of ESLC programs, learners are eligible to take GED and other programs offered by Eastern Shore Community College.

### **Moving Forward**

Our plans for the future are a bit unclear right now but we will be doing another book drive with the Kiwanis Club of Accomack over the summer, as we did last year, and have books available for distribution in Sept. It will take place during the June -early Sept period. We are looking for children's and young readers (up through Jr. high age) books. Are your kids growing out of their old books? Please keep us in mind as you clean out the bookshelves at home and email us at esliteracy@gmail.com if you have books to donate.

Eastern Shore Community College made an incredibly fast move to online learning and it is definitely an approach we will be investigating going forward. We have some challenges to overcome as many of our learners do not use computers, have no internet, and do not have an appropriate device to be able to use a platform like Zoom or facetime. We are taking advantage of webinars explaining how to implement

these new initiatives, and we are looking at moving our learner database to a web-based program to allow more working from remote locations as we anticipate disruptions going forward.

We are also looking into seminars for adults on the Shore to learn the basics of "practical internet use" which would include how to order groceries online, access a medical portal, check bank accounts, and order prescriptions. We anticipate that local banks would participate in these events. Many seniors on the Shore needed grocery delivery but were unable to order for themselves. Although Shore Delivery Corps made "tutors" available many were still afraid to try.

The generous grant we received from the Eastern Shore of Virginia Community Foundation has helped to fund the purchase of laptops for a potentially mobile office situation.

### **Our Tutors/Board Members in the Community**

Although we are not currently tutoring, our volunteers are keeping busy helping those in need during this emergency.

Tutor and Board Member Peggy Keating has stepped up her commitment to Manna Café CI, which is a food pantry in Chincoteague. Started in 2017 by Bill and Fran Lytle to provide food, fellowship and love to both the attendees and homebound residents on Chincoteague, it has evolved from serving a free lunch weekly to a total of over 21,500 guests in 2019, having a "take" table, and delivering lunch to 70 homebound individuals into operating a full service food pantry. In partnership with the Tasley FoodBank through the TEFAP(The Emergency Food Assistance Program) which provides American-grown USDA food to low-income Americans, Manna Café picks up 6000 lbs. of food weekly with a few teams of individuals– each team limited to no more than 10. Peggy and her husband Kevin are two of the people who break down and pack the boxes for distribution. With other volunteers, they also deliver lunch to 80 homebound residents, make sure they are ok, and respond to their needs.

Over the past few weeks their food distribution day has seen an increase from 33 families a week to 121 last week. Manna Café is a 501c3 charity. <u>https://mannacafeci.org/</u>

Board Treasurer, Jackie Davis is a key player in the Shore Delivery Corps, a new non-profit formed to assist our fellow Eastern Shore citizens who are at the highest risk for serious complications from the COVID 19 pandemic with the intent to keep this population at home and out of public places. From Jackie "We are engaging volunteers who are at the least risk of COVID 19 severe complications to deliver the needed medical supplies and prescriptions as well as perishable and non - perishable groceries to the doorsteps of the COVID 19 high risk population in as practical a virus free manner as possible".



Shore Delivery Corps Jackie's particular mission is in evaluating the most practical way working with all of our Shore resources to identify the highest risk citizens of the Shore and creating the Database of citizens in need, their contact information, address and identify a generic "needs" checklist that could be utilized as a template to coordinate needs of highest risk demographic with the supply chain committee.
